Mark Leddy is a partner based in the Washington, D.C. office.

Mr. Leddy's practice focuses on U.S. and European antitrust law, including civil and criminal litigation, the analysis of competitive issues in mergers and acquisitions, and appearances before antitrust regulatory agencies and the courts. Mr. Leddy is a leading competition and antitrust lawyer in *Chambers Global* and *Chambers USA* and was recognized in 2007 as the Chambers Antitrust Practitioner of the Year. Mr. Leddy was also named in *Euromoney* Legal Media Group's *Best of the Best Guide* (2006), and the BTI Consulting Group named him a BTI Client Service All-Star, as nominated by corporate counsel at Fortune 1000 organizations for delivering superior client service.

Mr. Leddy joined Cleary Gottlieb as a partner in 1986. From 1991 to 1994, he was resident in the Brussels office. Mr. Leddy received a J.D. degree in 1971 and an undergraduate degree in 1968 from Boston College. Prior to joining the firm, Mr. Leddy was with the U.S. Department of Justice for 14 years. He joined the Antitrust Division in New York in 1972, became Chief of the Division's Special Litigation Section in Washington, D.C. in 1978, Deputy Director of Operations in 1981, and in 1984 was named deputy Assistant Attorney General, the highest career position in the Antitrust Division.

Mr. Leddy is a member of the Bars in Massachusetts and the District of Columbia and is an associated member of the Bar in Brussels. He is admitted to practice before various federal appellate courts and the U.S. Supreme Court.

Mr. Leddy was involved in many major antitrust cases over the last decade. He successfully represented Maytag in its acquisition by Whirlpool, Coors in its joint venture with Miller and Alcoa in its acquisition of Reynolds. Among other matters, he is currently representing a major consumer products company in the civil and criminal aspects of a multi-jurisdictional antitrust investigation as well as ArcelorMittal, the world's largest steel company, in an antitrust class action in federal court in Chicago.
