

Maurice E. Stucke brought 13 years of litigation experience when he joined the University of Tennessee College of Law faculty in 2007. As a trial attorney at the U.S. Department of Justice, Antitrust Division, he successfully challenged anticompetitive mergers and restraints in numerous industries, and focused on policy issues involving antitrust and the media. As a Special Assistant U.S. Attorney, he prosecuted a variety of felony and misdemeanor offenses. As an associate at Sullivan & Cromwell, Professor Stucke assisted in defending Goldman Sachs, CS First Boston, and Microsoft in civil antitrust litigation, and he was presented two awards by The Legal Aid Society for his criminal appellate and defense work. At the American Antitrust Institute, where Prof.

Stucke currently serves as a Senior Fellow, he chaired a committee on the media industry that drafted a transition report for the incoming Obama administration. In 2009, he was elected to the Academic Society for Competition Law, appointed to the advisory board of the Institute for Consumer Antitrust Studies, and asked to serve as one of the United States' non-governmental advisors to the International Competition Network.
